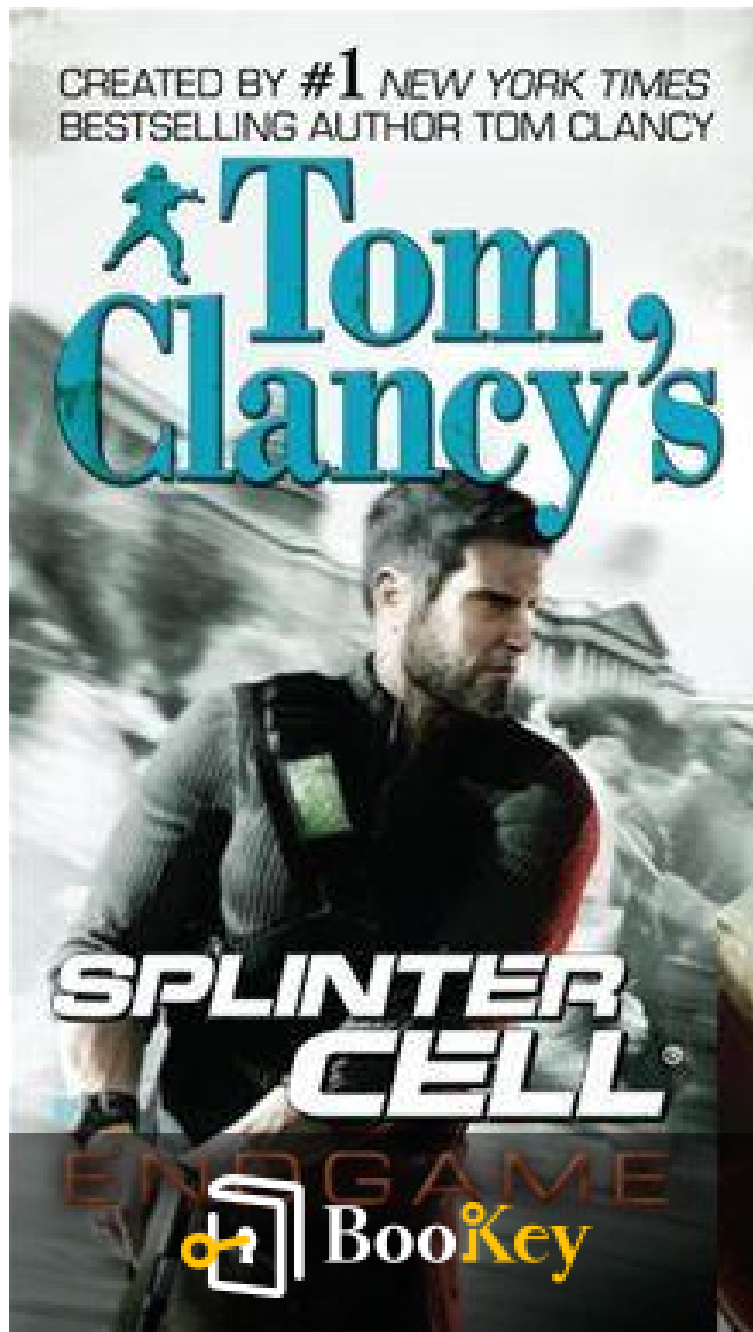

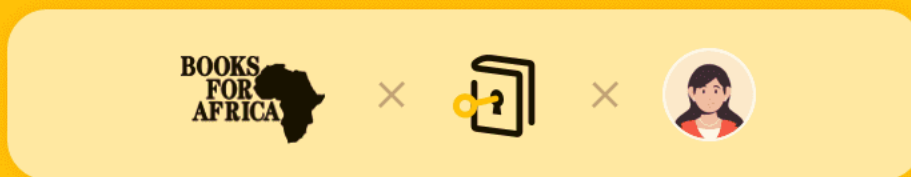

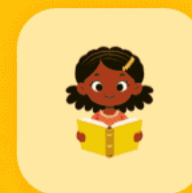

Sverrisson honored these wishes meticulously, opting for a private burial that ultimately hurt feelings within the chess community, particularly among those who felt they deserved to be present. Following Fischer's death, the complexities of his estate emerged, valued at more than \$2 million yet lacking a will, rendering it a source of contention among multiple claimants, including his partner Miyoko Watai, his nephews Nicholas and Alexander Targ, and a girl named Jinky Young, who claimed to be his daughter.
