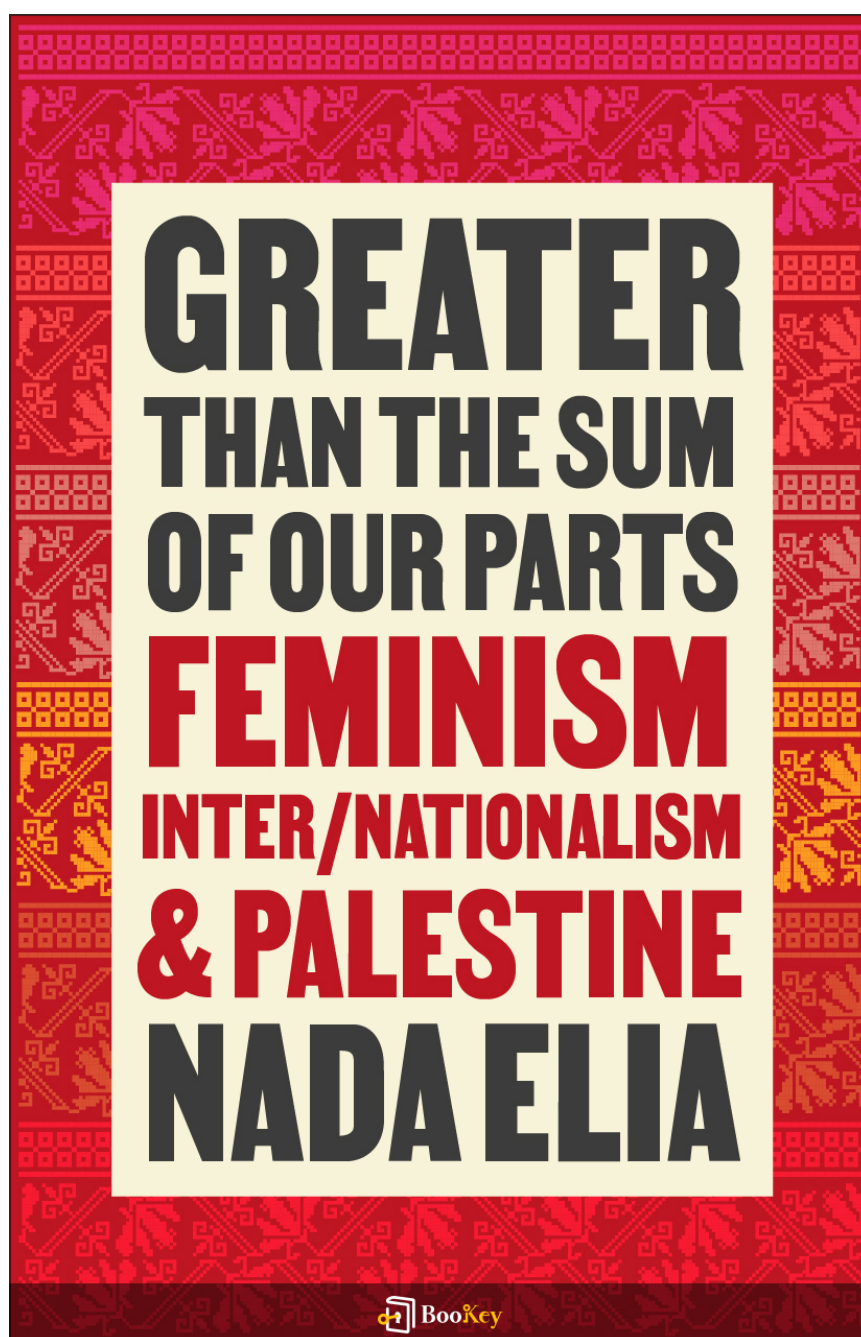

This holistic approach enables a clearer understanding of how different forms of oppression compound and the necessity of inclusive narratives in liberation movements.

6. Elia also critiques the concept of “pinkwashing,” where Israel attempts to position itself as a progressive state by highlighting its LGBTQIA+ rights while simultaneously perpetuating violations against Palestinians. The author outlines how this tactic obscures the realities of oppression and manipulates global perceptions, ultimately leading to a commodification of



resistance that can be harmful.

7. In synthesizing these themes, Elia stresses collective liberation as a goal, asserting that true freedom for Palestinians cannot be achieved without dismantling patriarchal and colonial structures that affect all marginalized communities. This shared struggle necessitates solidarity among various movements, underscoring the importance of unity and collaboration in the face of systemic oppression.

The chapter culminates in a powerful assertion that the fight against occupation and oppression must be intertwined with feminist and decolonial frameworks, advocating for a comprehensive vision of liberation that engages all facets of marginalized identities and experiences. By interweaving historical reflection with contemporary analyses, Elia invites readers to recognize the valor in collective struggles and the importance of inclusive narratives in the ongoing pursuit of justice and equality.
