



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3. Shift perspectives in dating by prioritizing spiritual alignment and a shared vision for marriage over mere logistics or chemistry.
4. Understand that earthly marriages can reflect and prepare us for the ultimate union with Christ, emphasizing love, grace, and a deeper purpose in life.

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
