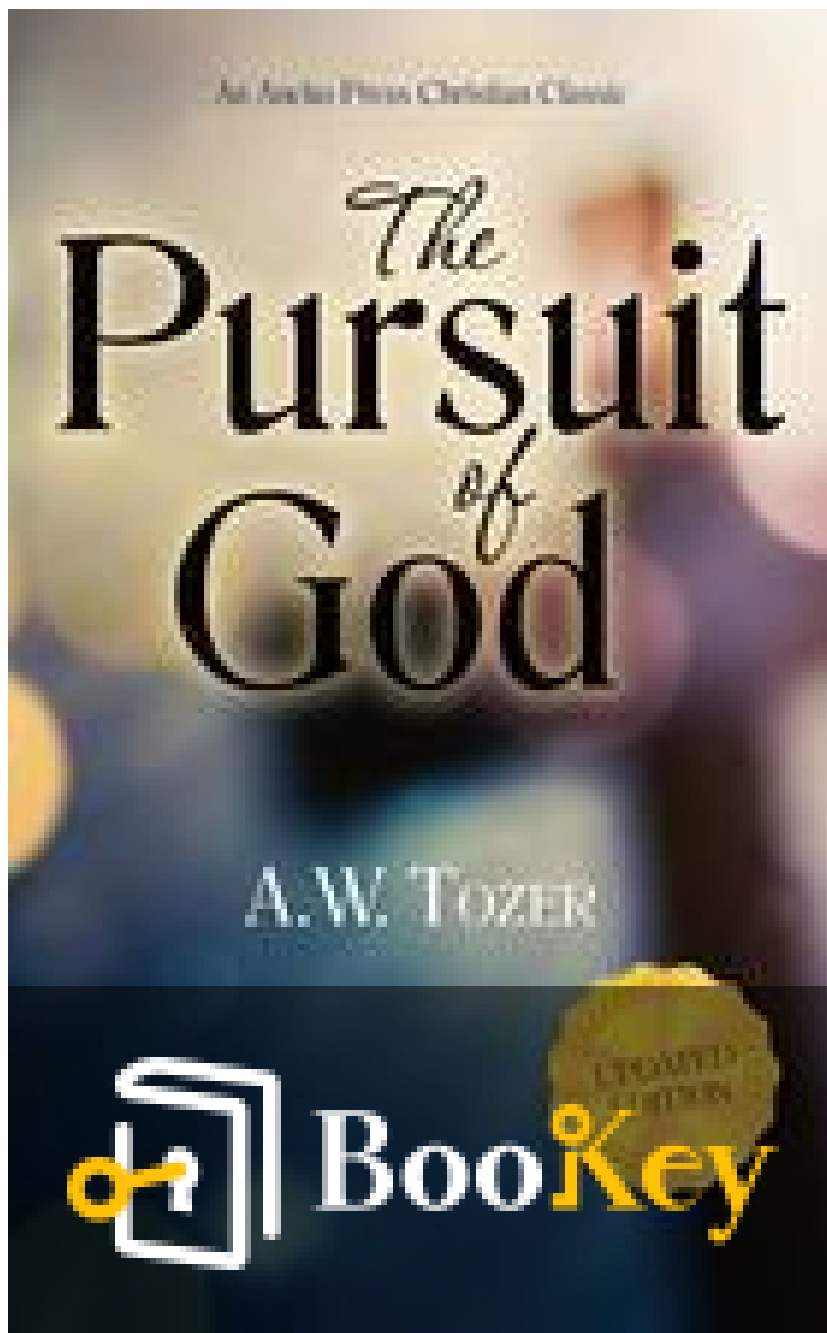

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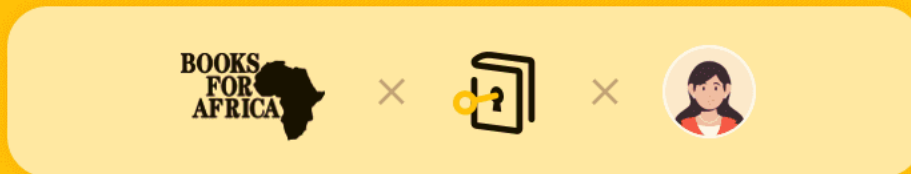
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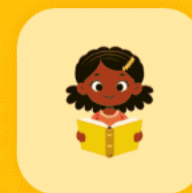

Tozer delineates various self-sins that Christians often indulge—such as self-love and self-righteousness—that the Spirit will challenge. The filling of the Spirit may come with trials and a stripping away of comforts, leading to

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genuine personal transformation. This process, although painful, is necessary to deepen reliance on God and to cultivate spiritual maturity.

Recognizing that spiritual complacency is an enemy of true spiritual progress, Tozer asserts that profound spiritual longing and experiencing suffering are often precursors to receiving the Spirit.
