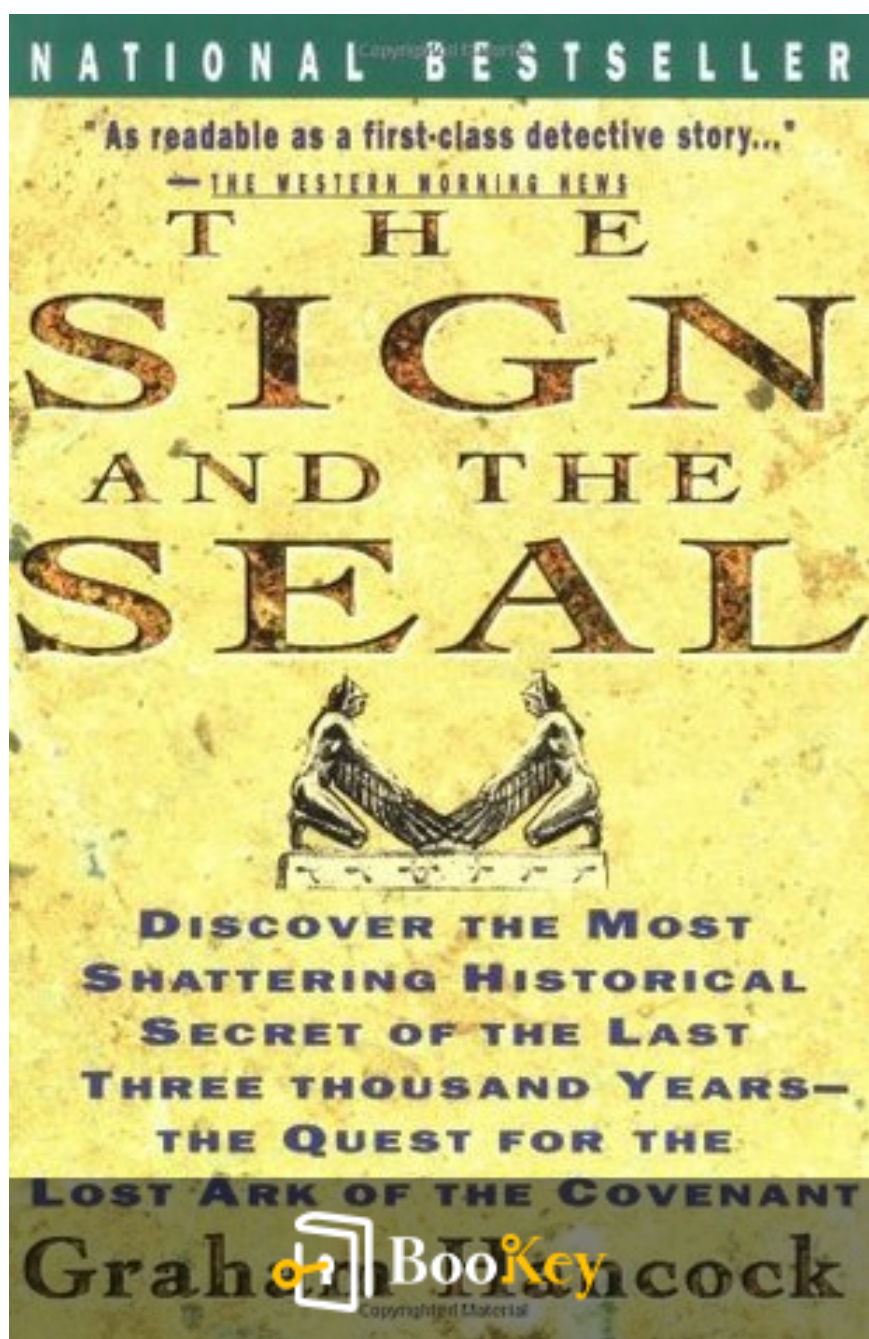

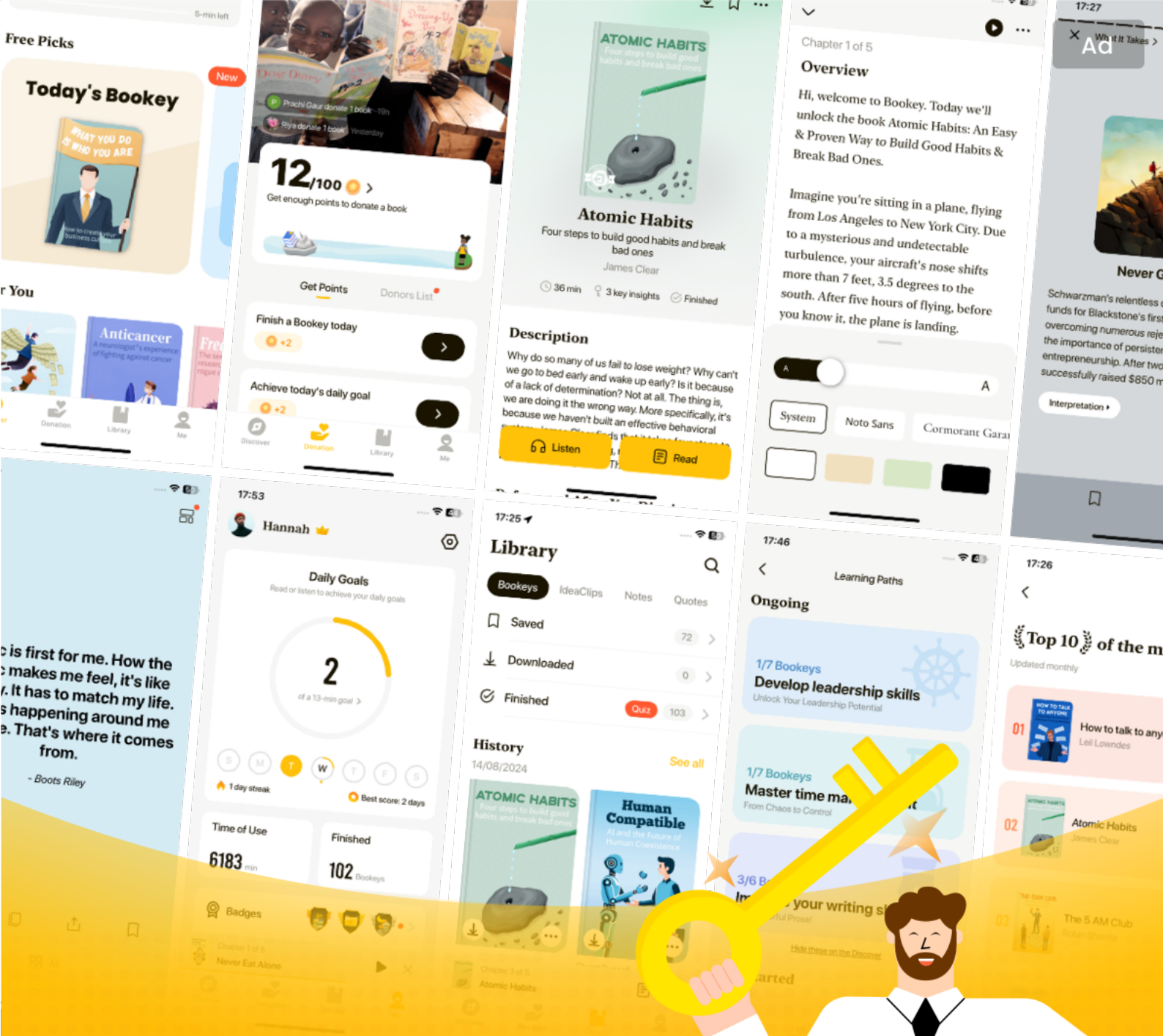

With Ethiopia's civil war intensifying, the author understood that his safety would hinge upon collaborating with the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF). His previous connections with Ethiopia from 1983 to 1989, when he worked closely with its government, complicated matters. Having established relationships with influential figures, including the formidable President Mengistu Haile Mariam, he realized that his past support for the regime's policies, including controversial resettlement initiatives, had put him at odds with the TPLF.

Haunted by the fear of retribution from the TPLF for his past associations, he tentatively reached out to their London office in November 1990.

Although surprised yet receptive to his plans, the TPLF informed him that acquiring the necessary travel permits from Sudan would be a challenge due to tense geopolitical circumstances, especially since Britain was considered unwelcome in Sudan.



Despite the odds, he endeavored to secure a visa—initial discussions with the Sudanese authorities resulted in discouragement, given the prevailing political climate. At the same time, the TPLF seemed to evaluate his intentions, wary that his quest for the Ark might masquerade as a cover for espionage.

In face of stagnation regarding his travel arrangements, the author devised a strategic communication approach: he proposed to offer the TPLF significant media coverage of religious freedoms in Tigray, a counter-narrative to accusations against them. Engaging an old friend, Edward Milner, a freelance producer capable of handling the project independently, he aimed to appeal to the TPLF's interest in bolstering their public image amidst wartime propaganda.

As he pressed this proposal, he secured a commitment from Channel 4 News for a story about religious freedom in Tigray, which would align with his desired timeline around Timkat. The TPLF ultimately acknowledged the merit of his offer, promising to expedite the necessary permits, grasping the value of the narrative to combat their undesired image.

The final weeks of the negotiation were fraught with uncertainty, yet on January 4, 1991, just days before his intended departure, the TPLF confirmed that everything was ready: his travel arrangements were set. Empowered by this breakthrough, he and Milner proceeded to Khartoum on



January 9, ready to embark on their journey to the sacred city of Axum, where history and faith awaited.

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Chapter 18:

In Chapter 18 of "The Sign and the Seal," Graham Hancock recounts the intricacies of his journey to Axum, Ethiopia, to search for the Ark of the Covenant. The narrative begins with Hancock and Ed Milner arriving in Khartoum, Sudan, and facing bureaucratic hurdles due to Ed's name matching that of a wanted criminal. Their experience highlights the disparities in security environments and bureaucracies they encounter.
